
Postcard

Overview:

First, participants will read a postcard from a whale (attached below) where the whale tells participants about herself and where she lives. In response, participants will make a postcard for the whale, telling her about themselves, their relationship with nature, and their own environment. The postcard can contain what the participants saw, heard, felt, and/or smelled in their environment, and an accompanying drawing! This activity helps participants build empathy for other creatures while improving their observation, documentation, and sharing skills.



Objectives:

- Practice documentation of findings.
- Practice sharing information, which boosts pro-nature behavior.³
- Build a sense of connection to nature and empathy for whales and other wild creatures.

Materials:

- Printed version of the letter from a whale
- Pen and crayons or colored pencils
- Paper or <u>Blank postcards</u>

Activity:


- 1. Share with audiences the letter from a whale (attached below) describing its environment and home.
- 2. After running the activity above, explain to the participants that they can write their own postcards to the whale and, if they like, include a drawing.
- 3. The drawing can be of the environment, plants, animals, the participants themselves, or of a feeling they experienced.
- 4. The postcard can say anything participants want. But if they need help, you can suggest they tell the whale about themselves, their lives, and the environment they live in. Here are some prompts:
 - a. How would you introduce yourself to the whale?
 - b. What do you want the whale to know about you?
 - c. How would you describe your home, neighborhood, backyard, and streets to the whale?
 - d. What would you tell the whale about your feelings and relationship with nature?
 - e. What are your favorite things about nature that you want the whale to know?
- 5. They can then take a picture of their postcards and share them on social media or let the library or school share it with the campaign hashtag #NatureStewardship. They can also give their postcards to the library or teachers to display on a wall or mail to a friend. This can also be an educational moment on how to prepare, address, and send a letter!

Target Age: K-2 and elementary school Time to Prep Activity: 10 minutes Time to Complete Activity: 15-20 minutes Perfect for: Indoors (classroom, library, home...)

Other activities that connect:

This activity pairs well (as a follow-up) with one of the outdoor nature activities such as *Nature Bingo, Senses*, or *One Square Yard*.
